SAU Launches First HBCU Cycling Team in the Country

April 27, 2020 – Raleigh, NC: Saint Augustine's University School of Business, Management, and Technology (SBMT) has announced the formation of the first HBCU cycling team in the country via the Department of Sport Management. This team is a club sport within the SBMT.

The team has recently been approved and registered by USA Cycling to compete in the collegiate club Atlantic division against dozens of other schools in the Southeast. The team, which has been in the works since the summer of 2019, will be coached by professors Umar Muhammad and Dr. Mark Janas, both of whom teach sport management courses within the business school at Saint Augustine's University. The team will begin competition as early as Fall 2020.

"We're excited to be the first HBCU to formally have a collegiate cycling team," says Muhammad who continues, "What many may not realize is that while cycling might be new to most HBCU's, African Americans have made huge contributions to the sport of cycling.



In fact, cycling's first superstar, and arguably sport's first international superstar, was a black athlete named Major Taylor. This team plans to pay homage to Taylor, as well as make its own mark on the sport."

The team plans to start with a roster of approximately ten student-athletes, several of whom compete in other collegiate sports. Dr. Janas adds, "We have the opportunity with this team to be part of several 'firsts.' In addition to launching the first HBCU cycling team, the virtual cycling events planned for the Fall will segue nicely into the new sports IT and esports management content offered in the business school. "This is not just the beginning of a club sport but also a precursor to esport courses within the Department of Sport Management.


"I am blessed and fortunate to be in a position to return the favor to few students that was offered to me when I was at St. Aug."

National Football League (NFL) Campus Connection Partnership

SAU School of Business, Management, and Technology are one of the four HBCUs to partner with the NFL as a Campus Connection Partner. In this partnership, the NFL is committed to the development of our students in a variety of ways. This Fall is already underway through an externship/case study program where six business students are working under a non-disclosure agreement to improve on significant operational opportunities. In addition, a Fall virtual executive lecture series was conducted over two weeks, and voter registration PSA was created to support the NFL's voter registration program. The partnership ultimately will provide opportunities for internships and full-time employment.

CMG

Last year, we received a call from CMG, a boutique consulting firm, about collaborating on a program to help students understand and prepare for careers in business consulting. This industry is demanding, but starting salaries for college students start at \$75,000 per year. The strategies and techniques required for interviews are different from traditional behavioral interviews. Our students could be ready for this field with exposure and preparation.

Several SAU was selected for the inaugural program, more than the other universities. After a successful launch, CMG is expanding the program to other North Carolina institutions and a few colleges in the Washington D.C. area.



Arise Veterans Foundation

We have partnered with the Arise Veterans Foundation to provide unique resources to the students. The foundation supports veterans with a host of services and has many partners to assist with its mission. For example, ARISE rebuilds computers as part of veteran "therapy," and our students are benefactors. Additionally, the Arise Veteran Foundation provides \$1,500 in scholarships each semester to students in our Entrepreneurship class working on repurposing leather from Southwest Airlines seats into tangible keepsakes. The leather project will be creating a must-have Alumni item in the spring... stay tuned.
