

Brief Bio:

Dr. Ruth T. Logan, Ph.D., attended St. Augustine's College (now University) receiving a Bachelor of Science in Biology in 1990. She obtained a Master of Science in Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics from the University of Maryland (Baltimore) in 1997. In June of 2017, Dr. Logan received her Doctor of Philosophy degree from Keiser University in Educational Leadership.

Dr. Logan has 29 years of experience in the education field, she has worked with the learning-disabled/special needs population for 24 years while serving as a teacher, program manager, program director, high school principal, and entrepreneur. In 1992, she became a corps' member of Teach for America and began her teaching experience as a student teacher in Bell California. Dr. Logan's first teaching experience was a middle school science teacher in New York City's Public-School System in 1992, she also taught in Baltimore City Public Schools from 1993-1995.

Dr. Logan began her special education teaching experience in 1997, as a science teacher for students with learning and emotional disabilities in a private special education school in Maryland. Dr. Logan worked for the National Center for Children and Families a community-based organization as the Education Coordinator and later the Community School Director at JC Nalle Elementary School in the District of Columbia. For a few years, she served as a business manager for Teach For America's Baltimore office, a program director, and later principal of a private high school in the District of Columbia that served emotionally disturbed and learning-disabled students.

Dr. Logan founded The Monroe School in March of 2006 and opened in September of 2006 in the Northeast quadrant of the District of Columbia. As a non-profit school, The Monroe School received its 501 (c) (3) status in 2014. In March of 2007, Dr. Logan founded The Maya Foundation Inc, (Metropolitan Alliance for Youth Advancement Foundation, Inc) a non-profit 501(c) (3) organization to assist students with academic scholarships, to participate in various school-based activities, sponsor annual college tours, and to provide financial assistance to those students desiring to attend college.

The Monroe School a college-preparatory school that serves students with varying academic, emotional, behavioral, and mental health challenges will celebrate its 15th year this March 22, 2021. Monroe is excited to announce its award of the prestigious GenCyber Grant awarded to mostly Colleges and Universities. The Monroe School will be the first K-12 school in the District of Columbia to be awarded this grant and one of only two K-12 schools in the District of Columbia's metropolitan area awarded the grant.
