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INTRODUCTION

The Office of Institutional Research and Data Analytics (OIRA) administered an online survey to seniors and graduates to gather feedback on their overall academic and college experiences at Saint Augustine's University. Major departments and the university use the results of this survey to make improvements that will benefit future students, so IR needs input from as many 2023 undergraduates and graduates as possible. It takes about 6 minutes to complete the voluntary survey. The responses are kept confidential. Nobody's identity will be revealed in our reports.

<u>Survey Design</u>: The 2023 survey was administered entirely online by the Institutional Research Department to SAU seniors and graduates who graduated in Spring 2023. The survey was made available on the SAU website. The survey was open from April 21 to May 5. We matched the survey population with transcripts to identify seniors and first-time graduates who graduated in 2023. For the first time in the university's history, eight students received a master's degree in public administration (MPA) from SAU. In Spring 2023, 107 students were awarded degrees. Seventy-one awardees participated in the survey. The survey was completed by all master's students. The final analysis included all 71 responses.

The survey is divided into the following sections:

<u>Student demographics</u>: College student demographics include information about age, race, ethnicity, gender, enrollment status and history, educational background, and settlement with urban-rural classification.

<u>Academic aspect</u>: Academic aspect section of the survey include information that reflect students' college and academic experience broadly, Information like student support, overall grades, enrollment in courses, major, and total credit hours were extracted through the survey that was designed by the IR team. Students indicate the extent to which they felt like they belonged in the major, felt respected by students and faculty in the major, and had a mentor or a role model in the major. Students rate the extent to which SAU contributed to their knowledge, skills, or personal development in various learning outcome areas.

<u>Institutional aspect</u>: This section of the survey includes information about students' college and academic experiences on student engagements, admission, post-graduation plans, campus climate, and services available to students to improve learning outcomes.

<u>Emotional aspect</u>: This section of the survey gathers students' feelings about their classroom and school, their sense of belonging and feelings of connectedness, academic perceptions, emotional well-being in addition to academic support, and mental health resources.

<u>Financial Aspect</u>: Given that college funding scenarios involve a student's financial contribution and commitment, the survey also sheds light on student loans and debts, as well as sources that covered educational expenses. The survey collects data on how students contribute to

their higher education costs and how committed they are to obtaining a college degree to help them achieve their future goals.

<u>Open-ended Questions feedback on SAU</u>: Students answer a final open-ended question asking if there is anything else they wish to share about their experiences at SAU.


Analysis and Reporting: We report survey results at the department and program level. Results can be found on the password protected SAU website, which requires a university sign-in or submission of data request








How old are you?



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SECTION I: DEMOGRAPHICS

Summary:

According to the survey results, 46% of graduating seniors are in their early twenties or late adolescence. More than half of the respondents chose "2022 or 2023" for the enrollment year question, indicating that the question was interpreted incorrectly. The ratio of full-time to part-time college students is approximately 8:1. Graduate students make up three of the respondents. Ninety-nine percent of those polled are graduating or have graduated this year. This survey was completed by more women than men. Eighty-two percent of college seniors are African Americans, with people of two or more races, mostly White and Black, coming in second. Approximately 89% of respondents stated that they intend to pursue a master's degree in the future. Half of those polled live in a remote or rural area. It's worth noting that 55% of respondents entered as freshmen, while 28% transferred from a community college or another university. Eighty percent of respondents are eligible to vote. Ninety-two percent of seniors have no military affiliation.






How often have professors at your college provided you with: (Select one in each row)


Average Overall GPA grade vs Major GPA grade




When did you decide to pursue your current academic major?




How many courses are you taking this term with pass/fall grading (as opposed to letter grading)? (Select one response only)






Did you participate in a transfer preparation program at this institution before enrolling here?

SECTION II: ACADEMIC ASPECT

Summary:

The survey's academic aspect section includes information about students' college and academic experiences broadly. Thirty-nine percent of students said their professors encouraged them to pursue graduate or professional studies. More students have a higher Major GPA than an overall GPA. Approximately 56% of those polled stated that they chose their academic major before enrolling in college. While we received conflicting results regarding pass/fail grading classes, most students do not take any pass/fail classes. The majority of respondents agree that it is simple to navigate campus and understand what requirements they must meet to graduate. Many senior students stated that pursuing opportunities abroad is difficult. Most students reported that they are not socially challenged. The data on transfer experience questions cannot be trusted unless all the seniors who responded were transfers. Around half of the respondents engaged in intellectual and academic activities related to and outside of school on a regular basis. Approximately half of those polled took an ethics class. Approximately 70% completed a capstone course/project, wrote a thesis, or took a comprehensive exam as a culminating experience for their degree. Prior to enrollment, 97% did not participate in a transfer preparation program. A similar proportion of students stated that they did not participate, making it impossible to determine how many of these were actual transfer students. Only 17% of respondents did not participate in any of their professors' research projects, implying that research programs could be implemented in future semesters.




How would you characterize your political views? (Select one response only)

SECTION III: EMOTIONAL ASPECT

Summary:

This section of the survey collects how learners feel toward their classroom and school. Over 50% of respondents agreed that the ability to work cooperatively with diverse people and to see the world through the perspectives of others are significant strengths. In terms of political views, 51% of respondents identified as centrist, with liberal coming in second place. Transfer student experience cannot be verified unless all respondents are transfer students. The majority of respondents had positive interactions with students from another racial or cultural group, indicating that the university values and promotes diversity and inclusion.

SECTION IV: INSTITUTIONAL ASPECT

Summary:

This section of the survey contains information about students' college and academic experiences, such as student engagement, admission, and enrollment. Fifteen percent of senior students were accepted to graduate or professional school and will begin classes this Fall. While 70% intend to work full-time and travel in Fall 2023, around 20% intend to stay at home to be with or start a family. More than 80% of students agree that work-life balance, job security, ability to pay off debt, job availability, and high income are the most important factors to consider when choosing a career path (listed in descending order by number of responses). More than 60% of respondents worked full-time while attending classes. Approximately half of students believe there is no racial tension on campus. Individual progress faculties elicited conflicting responses. The majority of students are pleased with both the academic and social aspects of the university. Students are generally pleased with the teaching quality of faculty and course materials, the technology available, academic advising, and the overall school infrastructure. Many students claimed to have done little to no partying. Approximately 43% of those polled studied for less than 2 hours per week. Around half of the students worked on group projects with their classmates. SAU seniors almost unanimously agree that the university prepared them for life and helped them broaden their horizons. Almost everyone was pleased with SAU's pandemic response.





Summary:

The survey gathers information on how students contribute to their higher education costs and their commitment to obtaining a college degree to help them achieve their future goals. Around half of the respondents received at least some financial assistance in the form of grants, scholarships, or other non-repayable financial aid. Approximately 60% received substantial financial assistance in the form of student loans or other repaid aid. Thirty-eight percent of those polled said they do not use credit cards.
