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DR. CHRISTINE J. MCPHAIL

Dr. Christine Johnson McPhail is the 13th President of Saint Augustine's University in Raleigh, NC. Prior to joining Saint Augustine's, Dr. McPhail served as President and CEO of the McPhail Group, LLC and a nationally recognized thought leader in higher education. She is the founding professor and director of the Community College Leadership Doctoral Program at Morgan State University. Dr. McPhail is the former president of Cypress College in California. She also recently served as a professor of practice at Kansas State University in the John E. Roueche Center for Community College Leadership Development. She is a Certified Associate for Emergenetics International, which helps organizations, ranging from small businesses to Fortune 500 companies, achieve desired results including increased efficiency and improved communication through solutions centered on the Emergenetics Profile and tools.

After multiple decades in higher education, Dr. McPhail served as a leadership coach with Achieving the Dream with a mission to help leaders shape the teaching and learning environment by engaging, aligning, and inspiring people to act. She has developed proven coaching and consulting methodologies and leadership programs that are now used by numerous institutions to help their leaders drive results.

Dr. McPhail is the recipient of the 2018 Diverse Champions Award from Diverse Issues in Higher Education, the 2010 AACC National Leadership Award, and the 2008 League of Innovation's Terry O'Banion Leadership Award. She served on the Advisory Council for the Community College Survey of Student Engagement and the National Center for Postsecondary Research at the Community College Research Center.

She served on the board of directors for the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) and the Council for the Study of Community Colleges. Dr. McPhail has also served as the affirmative action officer for Division J of the American Education Research Association and on the editorial board for the Community College Journal of Research and Practice. She is the editor for one of AACC's best-selling publications, Establishing and Sustaining Learning Centered Community Colleges, the coauthor of the best-selling Practical Leadership in Community Colleges with Dr. George Boggs, and author of Leadership Tune-Up: Twelve Steps to Becoming a More Successful and Innovative Leader.

Dr. McPhail's research interests lie in the intersection of three fields of higher education: leadership, governance, and learning.

OVERVIEW

In an effort to expand leadership development opportunities for students of Saint Augustine's University (SAU), during the Fall Semester of the 2021-22 School Year, the Office of the President provided the vision to establish an annual **Student Global Leadership Fellows Institute**. The institute was planned and implemented under the direction of the Office of the Associate Vice President for Student Affairs.

After engaging in an application and selection process, eleven (11) students were selected for the inaugural class. Applicants could be of any major and had to be a current full-time student enrolled at SAU (second semester Freshman, Sophomore, or Junior classification). The goal of the institute was to empower this group of Global Fellows with leadership competencies and experiences to propel them to lead in a complex, diverse, and rapidly changing world within the following focus leadership areas: Communication Skills, Planning and Organizing, Problem Solving and Decision-Making, and Building Relationships.

Four monthly interactive, inter-intrapersonal leadership training and development sessions were conducted by renowned national facilitators. Due to the presence of a national health pandemic, three sessions were held virtually and the final session was held in-person followed by an Awards Banquet.

To assess the effectiveness of the training, a written skills evaluation survey was administered with the students before and after the training to gauge the level of student learning outcomes. In addition, a program / speaker evaluation was administered following each session. During the sessions, there were also small groups and/or large group discussions to share and ask leadership questions.

To highlight civic engagement and global competency, both the America **University of Nigeria** and the **DJRELC Education and Leadership Center of South Africa** partnered with St. Augustine's University to allow their students and faculty to participate and exchange experiences during the training.

The capstone project is designed to consolidate students' learning with valuable hands-on experience to provide essential skills to evolve into well-prepared and well-rounded students. To ensure the Student Global Leadership Fellows Institute is marketed to capture a diverse cohort class, current student fellows in the inaugural 2021-2022 cohort will develop written recruitment and program orientation strategy for the 2022-23 School Year. Fellows will have an opportunity to use their leadership, communication, planning, and organizational skills for marketing the institute to a new cohort class. The capstone project will become the blueprint for selecting and advertising the institute. The 2021- 22 cohort will also serve as program goodwill ambassadors.

MR. MARCUS BASS

Marcus Bass is Executive Director of the political strategy and advocacy group Advance North Carolina which provides infrastructure support for local organizing and electoral strategy among black-led groups and underrepresented communities across the State. He also serves as the Deputy Director of the North Carolina Black Alliance - a 501c3 infrastructure building organization for churches, colleges, social and civic organizations , and elected officials.

Marcus joined Advance and the Black Alliance in 2017 after serving as Statewide Campaign Director for voting rights advocacy group Democracy North Carolina, where he led their long-term redistricting effort, coordinated millennial and faith-based voter engagement, and served as a key messenger for the organization. Prior to that Marcus worked for the North Carolina Association of Educators.

Marcus is the former Board Chair of Common Cause North Carolina and is currently the chairman of the Board of Directors of the NC State Voices affiliate Blueprint North Carolina.

A native of Eastern NC, as a student at NC A&T, Marcus served as Student Body President and led several grassroots efforts including, a protest of the News and Record Coverage of the Black Community, a student refund check demonstration, and the largest collective voter mobilization effort "Greensboro United March to the Polls" during the 2008 election.

Bass is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc., where he is the Director of political advocacy for the Association of North Carolina Alphamen. He is a former State Youth Department President of the Women's Baptist Home and Foreign Missionary Convention, former Director of NC Youth Bible Camp, and the 2009 President of the Council of Student Body Presidents.

Bass has founded 2 pivotal leadership development initiatives. In 2011 he began Camp Lead Up, a summer leadership institute focused on facilitating the transition for minority middle school students to high school through academic support, cultural enrichment, leadership development, civic engagement and community service. In 2014 he coordinated the first HBCU SGA Think Tank which was an annual convening of student leaders from across 10 of North Carolina's HBCU campuses. He is married to Bree Newsome-Bass and they have one son.



MR. TRAVIS P. JACKSON

Travis P. Jackson is a 2011 graduate of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University where he served as the Student Government Association Vice President of External Affairs. He obtained his Bachelor of Science Degree in Journalism and Mass Communication with a concentration in Public Relations. Presently, Travis is the CEO and Founder of HBCU Pride Nation (HPN), an engaging online platform with almost over 300,000 followers that promotes the connectivity, significance and pride of Historically Black Colleges and Universities in an effort to increase their positive awareness and enrollment.

HBCU Pride Nation has provided social media marketing services for Warner Media, Thurgood Marshall College Fund, Cracker Barrel, One United Bank, The Celebration Bowl (National HBCU Football Championship), Toyota Go Green, Honda Battle of the Bands, Ford HBCU Challenge, Regions Bank, the CIAA, the National Black MBA Association and others. HBCU Pride Nation reaches between 150k-300k people a week and receives 850k-1.5M impressions a week. As a motivational speaker he teaches leadership through the game of Jenga.

Travis was honored as one of the "Top 30 Under 30" African-American entrepreneurs in Charlotte by the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Black Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he was chosen the "Emerging Leader of the Year" by the National Black College Alumni Hall of Fame and "HBCU Top 30 Under 30" by HBCUBuzz. He was recently honored as a graduate of the inaugural class of Next Level Leadership Inc., a nonprofit that empowers African-Americans to lead in Charlotte.

Travis has developed and executed events such as the HBCU Pride Brunch, the official HBCU Brunch in the country for HBCUs and the HBCU Pride Experience (formerly known as the Hillman Experience) where over \$1.5M in student scholarships have been given awarded, nearly 3000 students have attended, and over 50 HBCU's have come to admit students on the spot.

As a motivational speaker Travis teaches leadership through the game of Jenga and his life story. He has conducted workshops at the National Black College Hall of Fame, CIAA, The Kings and Queens Connection Konference in New Orleans, the NASAP conference, the US Black Chamber of Commerce Conference in Washington, DC where he was honored as an "US Emerging Leader in Business" and spoke on "How to Build Big Brands on Social Media". He was also a featured speaker on "Sister Circle", a popular media outlet in Atlanta, GA, to talk about the significance of HBCUs.

Travis serves as a member on the Board of Directors for iSpeakNow, a nonprofit that instills passion, pride, and confidence in children and young adults by providing mutually positive and interactive learning environments so that they recognize their future is limitless.

Recently, Travis and the HBCU Pride Nation team was awarded their own Proclamation Day by Mayor Vi Lyles called the "HBCU Pride Nation Day" in Charlotte, N.C. which will be an annual holiday in the city that celebrates HBCUs.

The quote that Travis lives by is "You can't be Superman or Superwoman to everyone else and Kryptonite to yourself".

Dr. Ashley Little is the CEO/Founder of **Ashley Little Enterprises**, **LLC** which encompasses her Media, Consulting Work, Writing, Ghost Writing, Book Publishing, Book Coaching, Project Management, Magazine, Public Relations & Marketing, and Empowerment Speaking. In addition, she is an Award-Winning Serial Entrepreneur, TV/Radio Host, TEDx Speaker, Journalist, Philanthropist, Business Coach, and Investor.

Dr. Little is a Professor of Media and Entrepreneurship Comm at Tennessee State University. She is also a proud member of The Chancellors Round Table at North Carolina A&T State University.

Her university and civic affiliations have included Alpha Phi Omega Fraternity, Incorporated, Founder of 100 Collegiate Black Women (A&T Chapter) (2006-2007), Ladies of Excellence, Miss Junior, Miss Senior, Student Union Advisory Board, Student Government Association, Student Judiciary Council, a member of the Dean's List and Alpha Lambda Delta Honor Society (2005-2008), Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated; NAACP, and the Urban League.


As a 14X Award-Winning Best-Selling Author, Dr. Little is the CEO/Founder/Visionary Author of **The HBCU Experience Movement, LLC** the first Black-owned company to launch books written and published by prominent alumni throughout the world who attended Historically Black Colleges & Universities. As authors, they share a powerful collection of stories on how their unique college experience has molded them into the people they are today. The goal of the company is to change the narrative by sharing Black stories and investing financially back into our HBCUs to increase young alumni giving and enrollment.

Dr. Little is also the Editor and Chief of *Creating Your Seat at The Table* International Magazine and Writing and Publishing Coach for the WILDE Winner's Circle. She is very involved in her community, organizations and non-profits. Currently, she is the Co-Founder of *Sweetheart Scholars Non-profit Organization* 501 (C-3) along with three other powerful women. This scholarship is given out annually to African American Females from her hometown of Wadesboro, North Carolina who are attending college to help with their expenses.

Dr. Little received her undergraduate degree in English from North Carolina A&T State University. She received her Master's Degree in Industrial Organizational Psychology and the Honorary Doctorate in Humanitarian and Leadership from Global Oved Dei Seminary and University.

Dr. Little has been seen and heard on numerous media platforms including Black Enterprise(2X), Sheen Magazine (Print and Online), Fox Soul TV, NBC, Fox, CBS, New York Weekly Top 10 Hardest Working CEOs, US Insiders Top 10 Women Entrepreneurs, and CEO Weekly Top 10 Influential People. As an award-winning Best-Selling Author, Dr. Little won the Black Authors Matter TV Award in May 2021 and the International Book Awards by The American Book Fest.

Dr. Little has strong faith and determination to be great. She believes her only competition is herself. Her favorite scripture is Philippians 4:13 "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me".



As a fourth generation Historically Black College and University (HBCU) graduate, Rasheed brings an appreciation, sensitivity and insight into what it means to be a college student. He combines this rich context with his diverse experiences as an attorney, entrepreneur, and educator to empower collegiate audiences with the necessary tools for personal and professional success.

Rasheed combines powerful personal stories with a fact-based and interactive multimedia presentation style to both inform and inspire individuals to think critically about themselves, their families and their communities. He utilizes this approach to engage audiences in a down to earth, funny, conversational style that resonates with audiences nationwide.

Professionally, Rasheed has served as a federal law clerk in U.S. Federal District Court in the Southern District of Texas (Houston Division), worked as an attorney at Finnegan & Henderson, a prominent intellectual property law firm in Washington, D.C., served as a co-owner and operator of a quick service restaurant (QSR) and currently serves as the founder and President of The Harbor Institute, and an educational consulting firm based out of Washington, DC.

Rasheed founded the Harbor Institute in 2008, and since its inception, he has been able to present dynamic keynote speeches, interactive and engaging training sessions, and consult for thousands of students and administrators at over 250 colleges and universities in 38 states. He utilizes his academic, legal, and entrepreneurial expertise to focus and specialize on the following topics: cultural competency, student success, risk management (hazing prevention/intervention), leadership/business development, and Black/Latino male development.

Some of his work has been highlighted in Essence magazine's feature on social justice in Black Greek Sororities (July 2015, Reality v. Roots), Ebony (March 2017) and he has been the recipient of awards from both the National Association of Student Professional Administrators (NASPA) and the Association of Fraternal and Sorority Advisors (AFA) for his work in the areas of curriculum development as it relates to leadership development and students of color.

He graduated from North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University with a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree in Chemical Engineering where he served as Student Government President and joined the Mu Psi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. He later graduated from Texas Southern University with a Juris Doctorate (J.D) where he was honored as the Thurgood Marshall Student of the year for his academic excellence and leadership towards the community.
